Monmouth County group urges residents to report incidents to the police

In the wake of an incident in which residents reported KKK fliers tossed on their lawns, the Monmouth County Human Relations Commission encouraged those who might receive "bombs of hate," to report the incidents to the police.

"Even though it may not be illegal, it can be dangerous in its purpose of inciting crimes against minority citizens and immigrants," the group said in a release.

"A littering complaint is also a possibility," the release said. "If you see someone dropping these bags or in a similar activity, try to get a license number or as much description as possible of the car and occupants."
